MARCH NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Hopefully you will find an enclosure giving the details of the survey conducted on the Fingle Shoot and the reply the Council sent to the Dartmoor National Park. The Council agreed it was a useful exercise and lessons were learnt by the Council on the administration of any future surveys we might need.

Buses seem to feature on our agenda at the moment. It would be useful if any residents of Chapel Hill at Whiddon Down use the Dartline bus between Chagford and Okehampton and where they catch it or do you "hail & ride". Will you let the Clerk or a Councillor know and also what are your views about the use of Chapel Hill by the bus.

We are still consulting on the stop location for the late school bus at Whiddon Down because of the safety concerns for the children by it stopping on the main road.

As has been reported previously the Western Greyhound services 510 and 599 are altering after 15th April 2013, a copy of the new timetable will be placed in the Crockernwell bus shelter at Stanbury's Orchard and in the parish notice board at Whiddon Down. Following a request from a Whiddon Down resident who attended our meeting we will be able to reproduce the relevant times in future Parish Posts (must let the Editor know!!)

Following a request from the Council for an update on the Travellers site at Whiddon Down, Devon County Councillor James McInnes has informed us a notice to vacate had been served on the occupants and the matter was now in the hands of the County legal department. Four items of planning were discussed and the Council resolved to support applications 0095/13

for the conversion of a redundant agricultural building at Furlong and 0078/13 for the sighting of ground mounted solar panels at Budbrook Crockernwell. We had neutral views on 0114/13 regarding a certificate of lawfulness at Narracott and 0082/13 the building of a veranda and increase in size of a garden wall at Ford House Drewsteignton.

Potholes have been reported at Hask Lane, Veet Mill, Wedeson Hill, Sandy Park to Drogo, Greystone to Preston and Upperton and in the square at Drewsteignton. (in fairness to South West Highways, Hask Lane and Veet Mill have now been dealt with as at 3rd April). We are also concerned over the lay-by at Whiddon Down being used for the storage of stone chippings which are spilling onto the main carriageway and the wall crumbling on the A382 north of Sandy Park. We are still hoping for two parishioners to come forward to replace Drewsteignton Ward Councillors standing down this year, please contact the Clerk.

Parishioners especially in Drewsteignton, will like to know that Cllr Wayne Mudge was able to check on certain items in the Drewe Arms which are in the keeping of the Council but NOT all items. We are contacting Enterprise Inns with the complete list and will look to the future tenants to continue to look after the items. If not we will be asking Parishioners what action we should take over the items future security.

Our next meeting is **Monday 15**th **April 2013** at **Drewsteignton 7.30pm.**

March Bird Notes

I have just found out I am the last to submit my piece to the editor of the Parish Post (apologies, again!) but I have been waiting to try and see if we have any of our summer migrants to report and sadly, I have yet to see or hear anything that would indicate a change in the seasons. I have been busy in Exeter in my free time over the week-ends watching the Peregrine falcons on St. Michael's church at Mount Dinham, where we now have a camera mounted in the nest box where they are breeding and currently incubating three eggs. I have been working with the church on their recent Heritage Lottery Funding application which was successfully granted and then I co-ordinated with steeplejacks and a colleague to install internal access up the inside of the spire and then a camera into the nest box. During these regular visits, I connect up my lap top computer from within the church and record images of developments in the nest, which have been



fascinating over the last few weeks, We recorded the first egg laid, then the second egg approximately 57 hours later when the peregrines began to incubate during another particularly cold spell with easterly winds, and finally laying their third egg. The footage I have been capturing will be featured on the new church website prior to images being transmitted live via broadband installation at the church, which hopefully will happen over the next couple of weeks, meaning I along with others can watch from the comfort of home via the internet. It was on one trip (24th March) that I stopped in the car park along Okehampton Road, just off the Exe Bridge roundabout, to have a look at the church from a distance and saw four martins flying low over the water, hoping to catch flies but unlikely due to the cold weather. I didn't have binoculars at the time and they looked very much like house martins but could have been sand martins, which often arrive earlier. These were the only martins I have seen so far this year and I really hope that by time this copy of the PP is delivered, the swallows and martins will be back in the village and the weather will be considerably warmer. I started recording their arrival and departures in the parish in 2001, and despite the coldest March on record, they are not particularly late this year and should be here over the next week or so.

What has been noticeable to me is the lack of chiffchaffs calling so far, as I normally hear them from mid March (21st in 2012, 13th in 2011 and 26th in 2010) in and around Drewsteignton. I did hear that a friend had heard them in the woods in the Teign valley recently but I have heard nothing yet. Chiffchaffs are one of the few migrant warblers that I can recognise by their call, which is a plaintive 'chiff-chaff-chiff-chaff', and once heard just continues all through the summer, as the birds advertise their territories. Many bird species in the region are still thinking it is winter, as this week I have seen redwings, fieldfares, and mistle thrushes and there are still large flocks of over-wintering starlings in the area. It was only last week that I saw a small flock of waxwings in Buddle Lane in Exeter, feeding on berries. This is in stark contrast to some species like blackbirds that are already nesting despite the cold weather, and the house sparrows that persist in creating holes in the eaves of my thatched roof to make new nest sites. With the ongoing cold weather, I have continued to feed the birds in the garden but am scaling back now as the weather forecast is for warmer, albeit wetter weather.

Recipe Corner

Chicken Pie With A Carrot Thatch

Let the children help you to create a meal for the whole family.

Ingredients

I large carrot or 2 small

I large potato or 2 small

2 tbsp butter, melted

I slice cooked ham

3 chicken breast fillets

3 tbsp frozen peas, defrosted

4 tbsp double cream

Method

- I. Ask a grown-up to heat the oven to 200C/180C fan, then boil the carrot and potato whole for 5 minutes, then put them in a bowl of cold water to cool down. When cold, peel them carefully.
- 2. Grate the carrot and potato (cut them into chunks first if you are using a rotary grater).
- 3. Put the grated carrot and potato in a large bowl, add the melted butter and mix it all together.
- 4. Cut the ham into small pieces using scissors or a small knife, then cut the chicken into pieces.
- 5 Put the chicken and ham in a pie dish with the peas and cream and give everything a stir.
- 6. Spoon the carrot thatch onto the pie and ask your grown-up helper to put the pie in the oven for 50 minutes or until the chicken and topping are cooked through.

The Devon Home Library Service works in partnership with the WRVS (Women's Royal Voluntary Service). It aims to provide library books, (including audio books on CD, and large print books) to those people in the community who through ill health or disability can no longer visit the library.

Large print books, cassette tapes and audio CDs as well as ordinary print books are available. Some clients prefer non fiction such as biography and travel books, other prefer romantic novels or murder mysteries!

For those people who love reading or just browsing through books, but are confined to their home, this service offers a chance to have access to the library as well as a visit from a friendly face on a regular basis. Often clients and volunteers make lasting friends so there is satisfaction on both sides.

Easter Holidays

Over the Easter holiday, my family visited my grandparents in a holiday cottage by the sea, at East Wittering in Sussex. On one of the days we were there Mum, Flora and I visited Fishbourne Palace, dad was doing peregrine work so he didn't come with us.

The palace had been there since Roman times and was a home to the rich; however there had been a horrific fire and most of the building had burnt down. Only the west wing had survived the damage. Another thing that had survived was the beautiful mosaics, often seen on the floors of the rich people's houses. They had really pretty patterns even if they were a bit crumbled here and there. One of the most preserved one was of Cupid riding on the back of a dolphin, this was the mosaic that lined the floor of the hall way. This mosaic had been found in 1960 when workers had been digging a water tunnel; they had come across this masterpiece and other mosaics as well! Also in the museum were old knives, pots and fishing weights. The Romans were very ingenious for their time and even created under floor heating, it was a really amazing museum and I learned many things about how they lived.

On another cold blustery day, we visited the Weald and Downland open air museum, near Chichester. This was not a museum with cases and fact boards, this 50 acre site had 54 buildings rescued from medieval, Tudor and Victorian times. Most of the buildings were fully furnished houses although there were farmhouses, cottages, barns, workshops and even a small school. It was really weird looking down a cobbled street and seeing tudor and medieval houses, and then going in them with their straw stuffed beds and leather water carriers! It was a really cold day but luckily in some of the houses they had little fires which we happily stood by. We were given booklets and we had to tick how many items we saw on the lists, Flora and I saw nearly all of them.

In a Victorian house, we helped polish some cutlery and lay on their beds. In my favourite house (an old Tudor farmhouse) they had milk churns, old pottery and an upstairs privy. All of the buildings had been saved from demolition, and often they had to move the buildings brick by brick to their land, and then rebuild them again.

What added to the effect was the staff dressed in medieval clothes and horses pulling customers around in carts, my favourite horse was one called Neville! I really enjoyed visiting the museum, it was unique and a really fun but cold experience!!!

I hope every-one had a nice relaxing Easter!
