NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Following on from last month's Parish Post, the planning application for a farm shop at Whiddon Down did not appear on the West Devon Borough Council's planning agenda on 19th June so remains undecided. This Council has not been informed on what the applicants' intentions are so we wait and see.

The disused telephone boxes at Crockern-well & Whiddon Down have now been removed but we are still waiting to hear from British Telecom as to their intentions on maintenance of their listed boxes at Drewsteignton & Sandy Park.

Cllrs. Bill Savage & Anna Imrie met and discussed our needs with Karena Marshall of the Community Payback Scheme and visited four sites which require attention. An update on this, a group are this morning in the village of Crockernwell cutting back verges, weeding and generally tidying up the village. This group does work for several parish councils in the county and if satisfactory we will almost certainly be using them again. It is a great opportunity to provide useful voluntary work to those who are looking to turn their lives around and subsequently improve the environment we all live in, it goes without saying the Parish Council is grateful to those already voluntarily working to keep the villages clean and tidy, it was noted recently yet another resident of Crockernwell has been cleaning the road edges near his home, thank you!

We have reviewed the Council parish assets which were all agreed, but can anyone help

us to establish the ownership of the millennium boundary stones. One is at Sands Cross, Venton and another on the road from Whiddon Down to Hittisleigh at Fursham Cross. Does anyone know who paid for them?

Cllr. Graham Hester is in the process of agreeing a memorandum with Sticklepath Council on the ownership and use of the Visual Activated Speed sign shortly to be purchased. It's use will be shared 50/50 with them.

Problems with parking have again been identified on the main road at Mill End with some drivers parking their vehicles on the bridge! Continued problems in Whiddon Down with drivers parking all around the junction of Turnpike road waiting to pick up children from a school bus.

The Council had received a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act from a parishioner. We are legally obliged to deal with this type of request but it took the Clerk an extra 5 hours, over and above her normal work,. Councillors agreed she should be paid for this extra time. It does appear that the repairs at Great Tree have at last been completed and the road is fully open.

The Council supported a planning application for repairs to a wall and roof at Hillside, Drewsteignton (DNP 0272/18) In the Parish Post ten years ago the council were talking about how many new houses in Turnpike Close had been let to local people and the parish website was

The high pressure that has dominated the UK over the past five weeks resulted in June being the 5th hottest since records in the UK began in 1910. The effects of this heat wave can be seen with the local countryside looking very parched and little sign of green in the grass fields. This is not good news for farmers and their grazing stock, but it has provided ideal conditions for the swifts.

After their initial late arrival and slow start to the season in May, we have seen very good numbers of swifts through June as the non-breeders arrived and started investigating for nest sites for next year. It has been a joy to wake to the sound of swifts screaming over the roof tops in Drewsteignton as they chase around in groups, and hear them into the long evenings just as the sun is setting. I have been hearing the high-pitched trilling of hatched young swifts from some of my nest boxes which began about the 20th of June. Malcolm and some of his team will be coming to check the nest boxes in the village soon which enables us to confirm how many breeding pairs we have, age the young and work out the best time to put leg rings on them. It all seems odd to think that at the time of writing this (5th July), the swifts will be on the verge of leaving us in about a month's time. Enjoy them while they are here!

In early June, I watched a green woodpecker fly over the garden, which is the first time I have seen one (in or over my garden) since we moved to this house in 2003. I know neighbours see them feeding on ants nearby and I have heard their explosive and raucous calls much more over the last couple of years. Another good sighting I had in early June was of a hedgehog in Froggy lane. I did see one outside my front door last year, which is the first I've seen in the village for many years, so it was a joy to see another one, maybe it was the same one! I have also starting to notice an increase in sightings of pairs of bullfinches in the lanes with tall hedgerows around the village. These sightings are always the same and involve driving around a corner to catch a glimpse of a pair of birds flying briefly away before quickly seeking shelter in the hedge. The giveaway is the white rump that both sexes show above the dark tails.

I have a brood of 3 newly fledged swallows in my woodshed which is a delight, considering many people I speak to seem to be without 'their' regular swallows this year, and the general consensus is that swallow and house martin numbers are well down. I have also had a second brood of robins fledge from a nest box I put up in a bush near my back door. The Exeter peregrines fledged on the 20^{th} and 22^{nd} of June, at 47 and 48 days after hatching. Unfortunately, we had minor problems with both coming down to the ground and the first to go was VF (her colour ring prefix) who was found early in the morning having come down in a garden about I50m from the church. She was captured in a cardboard box and returned to the church where our local vet and I put her back on a nearby house roof. She immediately took off and flew I00m down the road before landing on a low 'Residents parking only' sign. We caught her again and replaced her back on the original roof where she sat for about 6 hours just watching the world go by and getting her bearings, before flying straight up and onto a perch high on the church.

VG waited two days until Friday 22nd before leaving the nest after her sibling, but all she did was drop down about three metres onto a wide ledge and sat there for a few hours. She wasn't seen again so when I was in Exeter on the Saturday, I went looking for her at the church. Both adults and a very vocal VF were present, but there was no sign of her, until I heard a juvenile calling on the opposite side of the tower from where I could see her sister. She was stuck down a steep roofed gulley and it was a hot day, and so, luckily I was able to access the long ladder kept in the church.

With the help of a church warden, we got the ladder up and I climbed up to get her. Rather than catch her, I managed to shoo her along the gully, under a buttress and onto the external drain hopper, at which point she flew, or rather glided straight down to the ground. A towel was quickly placed over her and we then got her in a box. She was very hot and possibly de-hydrated so we took her to the vets, and she was collected the next day by the RSPCA. They kept her in care, fed her up then put her in a flight aviary, and after 10 days she was brought back and released. She made a good flight straight up to the lower roof level parapet and perched for 20 minutes before taking off, flying around the church and heading east. There was little else we could do as her flight was strong and so we left. I contacted a variety of friends who either keep an eye out for the falcons and live locally or are involved with the project to ask for a sighting of both juveniles together or at least at the same time. I didn't hear anything other than just one juvenile with one or both adults at the church until exactly 48 hours after the release, when a friend texted me to say there was one juvenile on the south tower of the cathedral and another being fed on the church, He was on the top level of Mary Arches car park which is half way between the two sites and with good views of both. So all in all, a very successful, albeit slightly stressful fledging period for the Exeter peregrines in 2018! Nick
